

Rooms on View 2003 has been and gone. London-based interior designer Hubert Zandberg tells Sally Munro what caught his eye at this year's decor and design show



wanted to achieve something that incorporated a strong feeling of "Made in SA"," says London-based interior designer Hubert Zandberg, who designed Condi Nast House & Garden's stand at this year's premier decorevent, Rooms on View. "The stand was an urban-cum-ethnic take on today's Hestyles. Although it had a sharp international look, there were strong South African references to culture, childhood, past and present. In other words, it reflected personal soul together with locality and functionality."

For Zandberg this project became an exercise in layering textures, evident in the use of chrome, wood, lacquer, raffia and mohair, and successfully mixed man-made and natural materials together. 'I also wanted to show the irony of representing 3-D textures in a deliberately flat manner, for instance the dry river-bed image on a digital wall print by Di Botha and the cowskin wall hanging by Gerhard van Deeventer,' says Zandberg,

'However, it was the Khoi San image by photographer David Bruce in the background (reproduced here also by Di Botha) and the pure, pristine quality of ostrich eggs transformed into a slick post-modern chandelier that proved we can also take something that's close to our heritage and turn it into a new art form.'
